**Thomas Alva Edison** (1847-1931) was an American inventor and businessman who developed many devices that greatly influenced life around the world, including the *phonograph* and a long lasting *light bulb*. He is considered one of the most productive inventors in history, holding 1,093 U.S. patents (exclusive right to sell an invention) in his name, as well as many patents in the United Kingdom, France and Germany.

8. The world of Coca-Cola The following paragraphs of the story are mixed. Number them correctly (1-6)

In 1916 the uniquely shaped bottle, designed by a glass company in Terre Haute, Indiana, was developed to <a href="mailto:protect">protect</a> Coca-Cola from imitations. In the 1920s Coca-Cola pioneered in producing "six-packs", cardboard cartons that held six bottles of the drink. In 1929 a distinctively shaped fountain glass became <b>standard</b> and
helped to advertise the popularity of the drink.
Coca-Cola is the most successful product in the history of <b>commerce</b> . People on every continent, in almost every country of the world, are <b>familiar with</b> the name and taste of this world-famous soft drink.
Today, the Coca-Cola bottling system is the largest, most <u>widespread</u> production and distribution network in the world.
Coca-Cola was born in Atlanta on May 8, 1886, when a pharmacist named Dr. John Styth Pemberton produced the syrup, according to legend, in a brass pot in his backyard. When, by accident or design, carbonated water was added to the syrup, it produced a drink that was <b>declared</b> "delicious and refreshing".
The international growth of Coca-Cola began in 1900, when a son of the company's founder took a jug of syrup with him on a vacation to England. The same year Coca-Cola travelled to Cuba and Puerto Rico, where bottling <b>operation</b> s soon began, as they did in Panama, the Philippines, and Guam. The first bottling <b>company</b> on the Continent began operation in France in 1920.
One great leap forward came in 1894, when Joseph Biedenharn of Vicksburg, Mississipi, impressed with the <u>demand</u> for the drink at his soda fountain, installed bottling machinery and began to sell cases of Coca-Cola to plantations and lumber camps up and down the Mississipi River.
