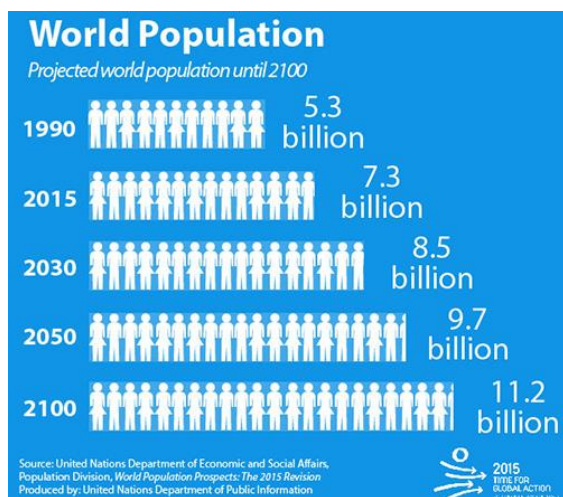

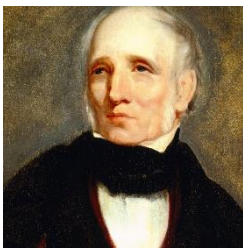
Task 6 Read the texts about some of the most famous **British poets**. Mark the following sentences true or false.

THE POETS



Blake was good at imagining things. He also had ‘visions’, dreams that he had when he was awake. He was an artist, and he drew pictures to go with his poems.

Keats died very young, but we can see his love of life and the natural world in his poetry. He looked for beauty in the things around him.



Wordsworth was a rebel too when he was young, but he lived for many years. He lived in the Lake District, a beautiful area of mountains and lakes in the north-west of England. He wanted ‘his’ hills to be free of tourists. Today, his house in the Lake District is visited by thousands of tourists – the same kind of people that Wordsworth didn’t like!

Byron was the most popular poet of his day. His poems were great and his life was exciting. The word ‘Byronic’ means someone who is romantic, handsome, free and a rebel. Byron loved Greece, and he went to fight with them against Turkey, but he was ill on the boat and died on the way.



Shelley liked travelling and lived in other countries. He and his wife, Mary, met Byron in Italy. They enjoyed telling ghost stories. One of these stories gave Mary Shelley the idea for her fantastic, world-famous book *Frankenstein*.

Coleridge was a friend of Wordsworth’s. When he was young, he took opium for pain in his teeth and head. Later he couldn’t stop taking it. He probably wrote some of his best poems while he was taking opium. He wrote a long poem about a sailor lost at sea: *The Ancient Mariner* (*The Old Sailor*). It’s full of strange and beautiful things. Today, it’s one his most popular poems.


